Preparing for your Spoken Language Endorsement Assessment


What do I need to do?

- 1. Complete the weekly tasks

- 3. Be ready to complete your assessment w/c 10th February

You should spend 45-60 minutes on your English homework each week.

- Monday 13th January Read pages 2 and 3. Watch the videos on Page 3.
- Monday 20th January Complete pages 4 and 5 in the back of your exercise book.
- Monday 27th January Complete pages 6 and 7 in the back of your exercise book.
- Monday 3rd February Transfer your speech onto small prompt cards (you cannot read word for word the speech you have prepared, it must be more 'improvised') Practice your speech.



The Proposal

Once you have spent some time researching, and you now feel confident on your chosen topic. Complete the following tasks to ensure that it has the scope to potentially achieve a merit/distinction.

- 1. Write an engaging title with a clear focus.
- 2. Summarise your argument/perspective in a clear and concise sentence.
- 3. Give examples of sophisticated vocabulary linked to the topic.

Writing Guidance

Top Tips:

- Pick 2-3 main ideas
- Get your facts together
- Persuade with a clear structure: introduction, main argument, conclusion
- Be direct and to the point
- Simplify after you've written your first draft, go back and look for words that you can cut out

Remember, the aim is to know your speech rather than reading it. Directly reading it may result in a pass only

Write your Speech

Is there a simple structure I can follow?

Introduction	 Make your presentation topic clear Detail what you will discuss in your presentation 		
Point 1	 Select a rhetorical device to use What is the first thing you want to discuss in relation to your presentation? 		
Point 2	 Select a rhetorical device to use What is the second thing you want to discuss in relation to your presentation? 		
Point 3	 Select a rhetorical device to use What is the third thing you want to discuss in relation to your presentation? 		
Conclusion	 Finish with a rhetorical question to keep the audience thinking about your topic 		

Prepare your notes. Summarise your speech onto small cards. Include key facts/words and ideas to prompt you.
